He came to see us in the coldest part of the winter. Elderly, disabled, and having a live-in caretaker, this proud veteran told us of his living conditions. Living in substandard housing with no electricity, no water, and no food, his situation was grim. CSNT immediately provided blankets and contacted local veteran organizations to seek



help. Before long, the local Veterans Resource Center and the local VFW were involved. In no time, our veteran wasreceiving food from CSNT, safe housing from the Veterans Resource Center and car repair from the local VFW. In addition to other help given to this veteran by CSNT and the good veterans of Cass County, a life was improved. A household situation was stabilized. The safe housing eventually acquired was in Morris County. There, CSNT helped him connect with others like the Salvation Army. These efforts further stabilized the household. From that first day, when all he wanted was some water and a blanket, life has vastly improved. CSNT was there every step of the way, making sure this veteran maintained his honor, his dignity, and obtained the safer and healthier life he deserves. Stories like this happen every day at CSNT.
